CEDAR HILL CEMETERY UPDATE

There has been no change since last year, bottom line. The work on the Legacy Plan, a Living Will of sorts, has been continuing. The focus has been to plan for the perpetual care of Cedar Hill Cemetery, established in 1858.

We have been working with the coordinator and initiator for several years of the legally formed & IRS sanctioned group, Jewish Cemeteries of Greater Dayton (JCGD).

The JCGD group is comprised of three major congregations in the Dayton area, all of whom have their own cemeteries as we do. They have to raise \$4 million dollars for perpetual care of those cemeteries IF and WHEN they do, we may be considered to join them.

Tzedakah, righteous justice, is the Jewish value that reminds us to care for those in need.

Bethany Center is providing take-out lunches and pre-packed foodbank boxes. They need: pasta, canned fruit, soups and canned noodle meals like Spaghetti-O's.
