Purim and the Hidden Essence of the Scroll of Esther

Megillat Esther, or the Scroll of Esther, is a Hebrew noun rooted in the letters Gimmel (a (and La mmed (לן. Together they form the word Gal (גל), which has a connotation 'to roll.' For instance, the word Galgal which is derived thereof, means a wheel. When someone is gleeful (gīl), they spin in circles (ma'agalīm), and in exultation (gilah). However, something that is revealed shares these Hebrew roots as well. For instance, a matter that is not covered or revealed is called Galūi, the very verb that denotes that action is Legalot. The Hebrew word revelation, Hitgalūt, also shares those Hebrew roots and can be understood as literally the 'unrolling or unveiling' of a matter. Conversely, the word Esther alludes to hidden, to be concealed — nistar. Jewish tradition claims that her real name was Hadassah (Myrtle, which is linked to the feast of Sukkot). Every time someone asked her name, Esther simply replied: "It is hidden." From this background we can infer that when we unroll the scroll, we reveal its hidden essence. In other words, Megillat Esther is the "revelation of the hidden." While the name Esther can be read in this scroll which is named after it, we should still question what is the hidden message of Purim though? Interestingly, the one name that does not appear in Megillat Esther is God's Name (YHVH). Notwithstanding, looking beneath the surface of the text, we can see that God's Name is hidden in multiple places in the scroll through using the Hebrew method of acrostics (called Notarikon). Under this optic, God's Name is there, revealed, uncovered, forward and backward in the Rashei Teivot (first letters) and Sofei Teivot (last letters). Let us see some exemples: (Esther 5:4) let the king and Haman come today — יבוא המלך והמן היום (Esther 1:20) she and all women shall give — היא וכל הנשים יתנו (Esther 7:7) for he saw that there was evil determined against him — כי כלתה אלו הרעה (Esther 5:13) this avails me nothing — זה איננו שוה לי

These words celebrate the great joy of the turnaround experienced by the Jewish people in that generation, who went from being sentenced to a violent death at the hands of their enemies to a triumphant victory over them. In time of national and personal calamity, God is there, if we only open our eyes and 'unroll the scroll.' Today, more than ever we should say: May the enemies of light, joy, gladness, and honor perish as Haman did — Happy Purim!
