Shining Light in Our Small but Mighty Community Jese Shell- Congregation Anshe Emeth

As the days grow shorter, night comes faster, and the winter winds settle over our fields, forests, and neighborhoods of West Central Ohio, our beloved community prepares once again to kindle the lights of Hanukkah—a festival that reminds us that even the smallest flame can illuminate great darkness. For our congregation, this message resonates deeply in my heart and soul. Each candle we light celebrates the enduring Jewish values of hope, courage, and joy, and affirms that we, too, carry a radiant spark that brightens the world around us.

The story of the Maccabees teaches us this lesson with timeless strength. A small band with unwavering conviction, they stood against an empire—not because they were mighty in number, but because they were steadfast in faith and purpose. Their resilience is not merely a tale of ancient heroism; it is a reminder that even when circumstances seem insurmountable, persistence and unity can create miracles. The miracle of the oil, lasting eight days instead of one, became a symbol of the Jewish belief that when we bring our best effort, G-d multiplies the light.

Our own Jewish heritage in the American South offers a parallel story of resilience. Many Reform congregations, of German origin, did not celebrate Hanukkah or even recognize it until the late 1850s, some even adopting a more secular rendition of Christmas, as displayed by the majority around them. One well-known tale recounts how, in the late 19th century, a handful of Jewish families in a small Southern town gathered each winter to celebrate Hanukkah in a makeshift shul above a general store. They lacked a proper hanukkiyah, so one of the farmers crafted a wooden one from leftover fence posts. Its candles flickered unevenly, but its light filled the room with warmth, laughter, and song. Despite their limited resources, these families built a Jewish life grounded in hospitality, mutual support, and joyful tradition—values that continue to inspire congregations like ours today, remembering that even a minor holiday can have a major impact.

As we light our own hanukkiyot—some new and polished, others lovingly passed down—we join both the Maccabees and those Southern Jewish pioneers in a shared legacy of perseverance. Hanukkah invites us to seek joy not only in celebration but also in community and in the light of G-d and living His mitzvot: in showing up for one another, in sharing food and stories, and in remembering that our collective light is far brighter than any single flame.

May this Hanukkah bring renewed strength to us all. May the lights we kindle shine outward, illuminating our homes, our neighbors, and our region with the steadfast glow of Jewish resilience and joy.
